Strategy for Addressing Gender-Based Violence, Sexual and Reproductive Health, and HIV in Agriculture: A Comprehensive Approach by Farmer's Pride International (FPI)

Vision

FPI envisions an agricultural sector where all individuals, regardless of gender, have equitable access to resources, opportunities, and healthcare services. By reducing the impact of gender-based violence, improving sexual and reproductive health, and combating the HIV epidemic, we will create a more resilient and productive agricultural workforce, ultimately contributing to food security, economic growth, and social equity.

SMART Goals

1. **Specific:**

- Roll out training modules for 5,000 agricultural extension workers and 1,000 lead farmers on sexual and reproductive health, gender-based violence (GBV) prevention, and HIV/AIDS awareness by 2026.
- Establish community outreach programs to raise awareness on the importance of gender equality and sexual health services for farmers in rural areas, reaching at least 50,000 farmers across 5 regions in the next three years.

2. Measurable:

- Achieve a 20% increase in awareness of sexual and reproductive health and HIV prevention within farming communities within the first two years of the initiative.
- Decrease the reported cases of **gender-based violence** in agricultural communities by **15%** by 2026 through community-based interventions and empowerment programs.

3. Achievable:

- Collaborate with local health authorities, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and community leaders to leverage existing networks and resources.
- Utilize FPI's established relationships with agricultural stakeholders to engage farmers and extension workers effectively.

4. Relevant:

- o Addressing gender inequalities and health issues directly contributes to FPI's mission of promoting sustainable and inclusive agricultural development.
- o By improving the health and empowerment of farming communities, FPI will foster better agricultural productivity and strengthen local economies.

5. Time-bound:

 Launch the first round of training modules for 1,000 agricultural extension workers and 300 lead farmers by end of 2025, and complete nationwide outreach to 50,000 farmers by 2026.

Objectives

1. Promote Gender Equality in Agriculture

- Empower women and men in rural agricultural communities by providing education on gender equality and women's rights.
- Encourage equitable access to land, resources, training, and decision-making in farming households.

2. Enhance Access to Sexual and Reproductive Health Services

- Partner with local health services and organizations to ensure accessible reproductive health services, family planning resources, and maternal care for rural farmers.
- Educate farmers on the importance of reproductive health and family planning, ensuring both men and women understand and access these services.

3. Combat HIV and AIDS in Agricultural Communities

Pathways

- Train 1000 lead farmers and 5000 agricultural extension workers to become community advocates, capable of leading workshops and information dissemination at the grassroots level.

2. Collaborative Partnerships

- o Partner with **NGOs**, **health organizations**, and **local governments** to conduct joint workshops, seminars, and awareness campaigns.
- Engage local influencers and community leaders to foster trust and credibility in the training process.

Pathway 2: Health and Wellness Integration

1. Access to Healthcare Services

- Collaborate with local clinics and healthcare providers to ensure that mobile health services can reach remote agricultural communities, offering sexual and reproductive health services, family planning options, and HIV/AIDS testing.
- Establish health fairs and mobile clinics to improve access to healthcare for farmers, especially for women and children.

2. Healthcare Awareness Campaigns

 Launch awareness campaigns that focus on HIV prevention, the importance of safe sexual practices, and early detection of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), leveraging agricultural events and gatherings as platforms for information dissemination.

1. Inclusive Economic Participation

- Ensure women have equal access to agricultural resources and training, providing them with the tools to increase their participation in decisionmaking at the household and community levels.
- Promote gender-responsive budgeting in agriculture to ensure women are financially supported and incentivized to participate fully in agricultural projects.

2. Support Programs for Victims of Gender-Based Violence

- Provide victims of GBV with access to legal aid, medical care, and psychological support services.
- Create safe spaces within agricultural communities to discuss and address issues of gender violence, working with local leaders to provide ongoing support.
