Transformational Training Program: Empowering Communities Through Capacity Building

SMART Objectives

- 1. **Train 600 Master Trainers per Country**: Within the next 12 months, FPI will train 600 master trainers in each country where it operates, focusing on government agricultural extension workers.
- 2. **Develop 8,000 Community-Based Facilitators**: Over the next 24 months, these master trainers will train 8,000 community-based facilitators who will directly engage with local farmers.
- 3. **Establish 13,400 Farmer Groups**: By the end of the third year, community-based facilitators will establish 13,400 farmer groups, covering nearly 400,000 households.
- 4. **Deliver Comprehensive Training**: Within 36 months, FPI aims to provide every participating household access to education on sexual and reproductive health (SRH), modern agricultural techniques, and sustainable farming practices.
- 5. **Measure Program Impact**: By year five, reduce the incidence of SRH-related challenges, such as teen pregnancies, in target areas by 30% and increase agricultural productivity by at least 20%.

Identifying Beneficiaries and Stakeholders

FPI employs a systematic approach to identify beneficiaries and stakeholders, ensuring inclusivity and relevance:

- **Stakeholder Mapping**: Collaborate with local governments, agricultural ministries, and community organizations to identify and nominate suitable candidates for master trainers.
- **Needs Assessments**: Conduct community surveys and focus group discussions to understand the specific challenges faced by farming households and design targeted interventions.
- **Participant Selection Criteria**: Prioritize candidates with leadership potential, farming experience, or existing roles in extension services for training as master trainers and facilitators.
- **Community Involvement**: Engage community leaders, cooperatives, and farmer associations to ensure alignment with local priorities and cultural dynamics.

Pathways to Success

1. Cascading Training Model:

- Master trainers, once trained, will lead workshops and mentoring sessions for community-based facilitators.
- Community-based facilitators will establish farmer field schools and outreach groups, fostering a participatory learning environment that addresses real-time challenges.

2. Knowledge Integration:

- Training programs will integrate technical agricultural skills, SRH education, and entrepreneurship to address intersecting challenges of productivity, health, and empowerment.
- Content will be delivered through interactive methods, such as demonstrations, role-playing, and peer discussions.

3. Support Structures:

- Provide facilitators with ongoing support, including access to training materials, field tools, and a helpline for technical advice.
- Establish feedback mechanisms, such as periodic assessments and community feedback sessions, to adapt the program to evolving needs.

4. Leveraging Technology:

- Utilize digital tools, such as mobile apps and e-learning platforms, to enhance training delivery and monitor progress.
- Facilitate remote training for facilitators in hard-to-reach areas using virtual platforms.

5. Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E):

- Develop a robust M&E framework to track progress against SMART objectives.
- Use performance metrics, such as the number of participants trained, households reached, and measurable community outcomes (e.g., reduced teen pregnancy rates).
- Conduct mid-term and final evaluations to assess impact and guide future scaling efforts.

6. Collaborative Partnerships:

- Partner with governments, NGOs, and international donors to secure funding, technical expertise, and policy support.
- Engage private-sector actors to co-develop market linkages, supply chains, and access to technology for farmers.

7. Sustainability Measures:

- Encourage farmer groups to form cooperatives or associations, creating selfsustaining models for training and market access.
- Facilitate access to financial resources, such as microloans, to empower farmers economically and ensure long-term adoption of best practices.
